Lutheran Church of Ingria in Russia (ELCIR) and are moving to St. Petersburg in mid-June (God willing) to begin work at the Theological Institute of the ELCIR there. With the receipt of the letters, we will submit our visa request to the Russia consulate in Prague. Once approved, we will move first to a temporary apartment in St. Petersburg, then look for a suitable "permanent" apartment home. Please keep us in your prayers as we begin this new aspect of our service in Eurasia!

Bypassing Babel

At the Tower of Babel (Gen. 11), God confused human language because of sin. At Pentecost (Acts 2), the Holy Spirit reversed Babel by the miraculous gift of language to the Apostles. Recently, I got to experience how the Gospel continues to bring people together across the divide of language.



Lecturing on Law & Gospel in Bystřice, CZ

Last month in Palanga, Lithuania, and in Bystřice, CZ, I presented lectures to two pastoral conferences. In both places, my presentations were translated into various languages—Lithuanian, Czech, Ukrainian—and those listening asked questions and made comments, which were translated back and forth into English, Czech, etc. Learning and discussion shuttled across the divide created at Babel, but overcome by the unifying power of the Gospel.

Approximately fifty pastors and other Lutherans attended the conference in Bystřice. Besides my lectures, the group

also listened to Rev. Dr. Arthur Just, Jr., of Concordia Theological Seminary, Fort Wayne speak about St. Luke's Gospel. We also heard lectures delivered by Czech and Polish theologians.

Connie remarked how amazing it was to listen to the back-and-forth between the languages, but especially how everyone came together across the divide of languages when the Lord's Prayer was prayed at one point. It was spoken in Czech and English and Ukrainian and Romanian—perfectly discordant to the world's ears—but it was plain (to borrow from Acts 2) that the Lord was hearing us praying "in our own tongues the mighty works of God"!

The call to serve as a theological educator in the region—which I summarize as “helping Lutheran pastors bring Jesus to de-Christianized Europe”—has been of special focus as I have presented at conferences and interacted with various Lutheran pastors and church leaders over the past months.
