Celebrating our First Year of Sem!



Summer greetings from the Dominican Republic. For the students of Seminario Concordia el Reformador, it's summer vacation time. Our first year of classes is now in the books. It's been a year of challenges, but also one of incredible blessings! As I look back on the year, and actually a little further back in the planning stages of opening our seminary, I stand in awe and give thanks to the Lord for what HE has accomplished among us.

For almost ten years, a seminary has been in the strategic plan of the Dominican Republic Lutheran Mission (DRLM). It started with missionary pastors teaching new Christians. In 2010 a partnership was formed with Concordia Seminary in Argentina to assist in carrying out theological education in the DR. The agreement between the DRLM and Argentina stated that by 2017 a Lutheran seminary would be opened in the Dominican Republic. By God's grace in August of 2017, that became a reality as we welcomed our first incoming students.

Our first year of classes began on September 11, 2017 and ended on June 15, 2018. Just before the end of our third trimester, I invited faculty and students over to our house for a celebratory meal to bring the year to a close (see pic above). As Director, I had the opportunity to speak and thank the students for their patience, dedication and hard work throughout the year. All of the students then expressed their humble gratitude for the opportunity to study theology and walk alongside church-planting pastors inside and outside the classroom as they are formed for pastoral ministry.

Our next academic year begins September 3. For now, guys are headed home. They'll rest a bit, work, and preach in their home congregations, most of the things our American sem students do during break. We faculty members have time to rest as well. But as soon as the summer flies by, it's back in the saddle. I can't wait! Thank you for your prayers and gifts that support this wonderful dream made reality!

Every so often I like to bring along my family along with our deaconess and pastoral students. One Saturday afternoon last month as we were visiting a new church family, Andrei was invited to swim in their makeshift pool off the front of the house. He had a blast. Our friend Freddy from church had just as much fun fixing it all up for him.

Our congregation in Las Americas is doing very well, despite the absence of her main pastor, Willy Gaspar, for the

This is a big step. A little over a year ago we helped our church leaders get organized into three groups to work with: 1) Finances, 2) Maintenance and Cleaning and 3)

We are happy to be installing one of our own seminary students as our next vicar on July 1. Isaac Machado from Venezuela will serve one year of vicarage in Santo Domingo. We also have plans for Seminarian Marcelo Rivas and family from Chile to spend the summer in Santo Domingo to lend a hand. This will be a huge help as our family heads to the states for the month of July for some down time with family.

Visiting short-term teams are a lot of fun for us. We had a team of deaconess students from Concordia Theological Seminary with us in May. In July a team from Faith Community Lutheran in Las Vegas will lead marriage workshops in all of our missions. St. John's Lutheran in Plymouth, WI will also visit Santiago and work in our Lacey mission for a week. Let us know if your congregation is interested in a short-term visit. We'd love to see you here!
