## Dale's Ear Surgery - Thanks Be to God! -

We were concerned a little. After all, we were going to a hospital outside of Prague proper. English language skills here drop off quickly once you leave Prague proper. And that was definitely the case in Benešov! While the doctors all spoke English, there was barely any

more of it from nurses, assistants, food servers, and even roommates. It put what little Czech we have learned to the test. But it went amazingly well! In fact, we thank and praise God that He sent us kind and patient people who were a blessing.

The surgery that Dale underwent—a replacement of some of the little bones in the inner ear—can only be described as a success. There was a glitch. The bones were far more brittle than they expected, and they had to replace more in one place and less in another; but the surgery that went longer than expected has already provided amazing results.

They say it can take up to several months before hearing comes along as far as it is going to come. So, we will be patient and continue to pray to the Lord for Dale's ear to be restored. But, even now we can rejoice that a sense of spatial hearing has already returned and that he can now tell when someone on his right (the direction of the bad ear) is speaking to him. We will go with this step by step.

## Pokoj and the Sense of Peace

Language learning continues to be a challenge and a blessing to us. We love our classes and are blessed to have an awesome teacher, who happens to also be a sister in Christ. Recently, we learned about one of the Czech words for peace: pokoj (pronounced *PO-koy*). The English word for peace is usually defined as a negative: the absence of strife and war. The word for that meaning here is mir (pronounced *meer*). Pokoj, on the other hand, has a sense of tranquility and calmness; it is a positive statement of a gift given. It is very similar to the Hebrew word shalom; in fact, it is the word that the Czech Bible uses to translate shalom in Num. 6:26 (*the LORD lift up his countenance upon you and give you peace*).

While hospitalized lately, we went out of Dale's room for a walk. As we returned, we looked at the sign by his door and noticed it said POKOJ 4. At first, we thought we had forgotten the exact word for peace. So, as we often do, we went to our Google Translate app on our phone and stuck in the word pokoj. It came back not only with "peace" but also the word "room" or "apartment." This language always has more to give!

We immediately went in our mind to the psalm that states: *He brought me out into a broad place; he rescued me, because he delighted in me.* (Ps. 18:19 ESV) Here, as in other places in the Psalms, a sense of peace is described as being in a broad place (Psalms 18:36; 31:8; 37:23); whereas, the Hebrew word for distress comes from the verb "to be hemmed in." Yes, peace, more specifically God's peace, is where He gives us space to hear His Word, to be healed by His Word, and to know that our enemies cannot overcome us, because we have a broad place in Christ Jesus, our Lord. Thank God for lessons learned in odd places!
