This month, Aimee and JP led a training session for the Luther Institute of Southeast Asia (LISA). The course sought to equip 30+ local church leaders (pastors, deaconesses, and others) with tools to share their faith in a personal, contextualized manner. In the Parable of the Sower, we see the Sower God who sows the seed of His Word in all kinds of strange soils. Even as we celebrate the God who plants His seed extravagantly, the reality of different kinds of soil is also instructive. The course was designed to help Khmer Christians discern the different kinds of "soil" all around them and use God's Word thoughtfully and appropriately to plant seeds.

The first tool for discerning soil, taught by a missionary friend, was an exploration of traditional Khmer values and a biblical response that recognizes both connections and departures. The second tool was the Law/Gospel dynamic in which we discern whether someone first needs to be shown their sin or whether they are ready to hear the saving Gospel. A third tool is the variety of images the Bible uses for God's saving action in our lives, e.g. justification, reconciliation, adoption, conversion, illumination, etc. These speaks of the ONE action of God in Christ in a VARIETY of different ways, giving us freedom to apply the Gospel in ways that are specific to a person's situation. Finally, Aimee (pictured) emphasized how simple love and care for the felt needs of people can be a powerful tool for "preparing the soil," creating an environment of trust where opportunities for sharing about Jesus abound.
