I have heard so much about them and seen many native paintings of them, including one in my living room. When the red and yellow trees began blooming last month, I was not disappointed; it was definitely worth the wait! Although it feels like summer here year-round, there still are seasons per se: currently it’s mango season (again), avocado season, hurricane season and *flamboyán* season!

This month I also witnessed the great migration of the Sahara Desert. Who knew desert dust could travel in cloud form over the ocean and make its way to this little island in the Caribbean I call home! We experienced brown, dusty skies for a few days and a thick air with little breeze, but other than that life was normal as I experienced my first dust storm in the midst of a global pandemic. (I never thought I would say that sentence!)
