## How can they hear

Back in the 4<sup>th</sup> century, people had a different idea about what a deaf person could accomplish. St. Augustine is reported to have said, "*those born deaf are incapable of ever exercising the Christian faith, for they cannot hear the Word.*" Augustine was correct in part of his thinking. The deaf could not "hear" the Word. This greatly influenced many Christian people in their attitudes towards deaf people. But as part of the quote that is often missed, Augustine also said, "*The deaf cannot hear the Word, and they cannot read the Word.*" So, Augustine left open the possibility of deaf people being able to be exercise the Christian faith if they could read the Word. So, in a sense, the "hearing" could happen with the eyes.

What the people during the time of Augustine experienced with the deaf is not too different from what many people's experience is today. Perhaps, an analogy would help. My wife goes up the mountain to the food store. It is a struggle that she manages several times a week. She has gotten used to climbing up the long stretch of steps. Occasionally, my wife persuades me to go to the food store with her. It is a greater struggle for me to go up the mountain than it is for my wife. She faces this mountain much more often that I do. I am not used to going up those steps. In the same way, deaf people daily face the mountain of communication trying to figure out what other people are saying. This is routine for them and for my deaf wife.

Jesus Christ said, "**Love** one another, as I have loved you." +++

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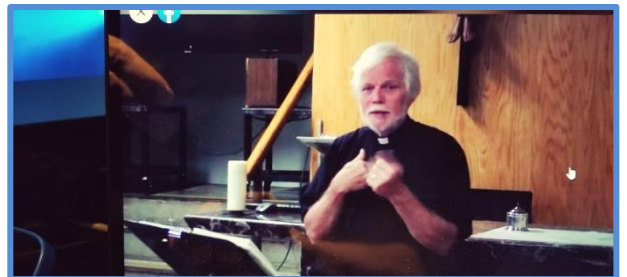
When the average person meets a deaf person, they are not used to figuring out what the deaf person is trying to say. The experience is one which the hearing person is unaccustomed, and the occasion becomes uncomfortable. But for the deaf person, it is a routine matter.

When something is new to us, we are uncomfortable with it. There is a learning curve for anything new. But in time, we can make the adjustment, if we are open and willing.

It has been an adjustment for us learning Hong Kong Sign Language. Just as American Sign Language has borrowed from the written English, so the Hong Kong Sign Language borrows from the written Chinese. This makes the acquisition of the Hong Kong Sign Language more challenging. But it is a worthwhile endeavor. Because, contrary to what Augustine and many others thought, the deaf can learn to read the Bible, and they can learn to "hear" with their eyes doing the listening. Sign language makes the Word visible as well. This gives new meaning to, "the Word became flesh." Pray that Barbara and I can continue to work with our colleagues and friends to help the deaf here "exercise the Christian faith." +++
