How might emphasizing God's ownership of the mission change the way we do and evaluate it? Who is your Jerusalem, Judea, Samaria, and ends of the earth (acts 1:8)? How do Khmer people talk about suffering and how is



this different from or the same as what we see in Acts? These and many other important questions provided plenty of discussion during a three-day seminar on God's mission in the book of Acts. J.P. was invited to lead the seminar by the director of Lutheran hour Ministries' office in Cambodia. Looking at Acts, we identified the main actor in mission, its scope and audience, its means, and its character. Each lesson then aimed to contextualize the theme for Khmer Christians today. What a wonderful opportunity! Learn more here.

To continue learning about Lutherans working in country, Celeste and J.P. traveled to Battambang to visit Gregory Holz, an LCMS member who has been living in Cambodia for nearly 13 years. After starting a family in Cambodia, he established <u>Crossing Cambodia</u>, a Christian nongovernmental organization that works with street kids in Battambang. Crossing Cambodia serves 28 children from families struggling with poverty. Each day, Crossing Cambodia's staff pick up the kids, feed them breakfast, take them to school, feed them lunch, offer after-school



tutoring and mentorship, and take them back home. Without Crossing Cambodia's help, these kids, who range in age from 5 through high school, would be malnourished and not be in school. But because of Crossing Cambodia's long-term help, they can properly develop physically, intellectually, and also spiritually. See more here.
