the choir graduated, she has been teaching the music for the choir, including a large group of new students.




It was an exciting day. We got to see students who began here at the same time we did for one more time.

Culture Contrast

One difference between American and east African cultures is attitudes about what is morally right and wrong. Abortion and, homosexuality and various other sexual variations are relatively accepted in western countries but totally unacceptable to the culture here, which places a very high value on having children. American attempts to use financial aid as a way to promote acceptance of these things as "human rights" produce significant resistance.

Any drinking of alcohol is also considered seriously wrong by most East Africans. This seems to be partly due to historical roots of the mission work here and the strength of fundamentalist churches, but many Lutherans also say that for East Africans, any drinking always leads to getting drunk without the ability to practice moderation. This attitude does not seem to hold true in former French colonies.

At the same time, sexual activity before and outside marriage and having more than one wife, while seen as wrong by Christians, seems to be more common and socially accepted. This also may be related to the importance of having children but it does lead to major problems with sexually transmitted disease. Our curriculum has a whole course on dealing with HIV/Aids.

Please pray for us, praising God for His gifts of life, thanking Him for His instructions on how to live, and asking Him to lead all to obedience and forgiveness when we fail.

People wonder...

What languages do your students use?

When I was handing out books to students, I asked each one what languages were best for them, since I could get more books for them from Lutheran Heritage Foundation in some East African Languages.

I was surprised that the majority said English, since the English of many does not seem very good. It was explained to me that they may be better at speaking another language but better at reading English. Some have never learned to read their mother tongue.

The second most common was Swahili, the main language of Tanzania and some Kenyans, although this is not known at all by some students. Among Kenyans, the tribal languages most often mentioned were Kisii and Luo, the two tribes in this area, and also Kimeru and Maasai.

For one Kenyan student it is Kikamba, also spoken in parts of Uganda where Luganda is more common.

The students from Rwanda use Kinyarwanda and also some French. French is the best language for those from Congo and Burundi.

Those from Malawi use Chichewa. Students from South Sudan use English but their mother tongues are Dinka or Nuer.

Please pray for us, praising God for loving those of every tribe and language, thanking Him for giving His word in human language, and asking Him to help all of us understand and teach it well.
