For the LCMS this all takes time and that's o.k. because our proclamation of Christ to the world is impacted by it. ## COMING UP

While much of our effort is going toward preparing for the meeting between the GKLI and LCMS Church Relations, there are some important projects on the horizon. We remain committed to providing theological resources and education to the GKLI.

#### **Continuing Education**

The GKLI will hold its annual pastors' conference over the last week of November. They have asked for an introduction to the Formula of Concord. The entire book of Concord first became available in Indonesian in 2004, but it wasn't widely available to GKLI congregations until 2016. So the GKLI has not had opportunity to study this important piece of the Lutheran Confessions.

#### **Looking to Expand**

We are planning an education event on the Island of Batam, where there are two GKLI congregations. The GKLI is working to extend invitations to other non-GKLI congregations, their pastors, elders, and members. This is great news as we desire our work with the GKLI to be a blessing to as many people as possible in Indonesia.

## Theological Works for Translation and Publication

Dr. Robert Kolb has graciously granted us permission to translate and distribute *Teaching God's Children His Teaching* in Indonesia. Our translator is beginning to work on the text now and we hope to have the translation completed before the end of June 2024. We have also received a preliminary proposal from CPH to translate and distribute 3,000 copies of *Praying Luther's Small Catechism* by Dr. John Pless.

Additionally, we're working to publish and distribute a daily devotional resource for pastors and congregational leaders of the GKLI. Called an Almanak, it is a common annual publication for denominations in Indonesia. This year we are working to strengthen the devotional aspects with daily readings, prayers, themes for Sunday worship, and including a copy of the Augsburg Confession translated into Indonesian.
