Some are from our partner church in Brazil where the language is Portuguese. They are first learning English, the language used to teach here. Linda talks twice each week,



alks twice each week, through the computer, with a son from one of the families to help with English conversation so that he will be able to go to school here.

Culture Contrast

One difference between American culture and some other countries is what is known as "Power Distance." That is when those who have authority or honor (sometimes because of wealth) are considered to be high above other people. This includes elected officials, teachers, pastors and, in our case, Americans.

One thing this means is that those who are in some position of authority are assumed to know what is right and what they say is seldom openly questioned. This seems strange to Americans who assume everyone should have their say.

Those in authority may commonly tell whoever they happen to see to do something for them – take this somewhere or go to get that - without asking if it is convenient for them or not.

One thing this means is that it is difficult for us to carry much of anything in public. If a student sees us, they will come and expect that they should carry it for us. (It does not seem this is only because we are "old.")

Please pray for us, praising God for being Lord of all, thanking Him for authorities that serve us, and asking Him to right respect to them but honor to Him above all.

How are the roads there?

The roads in Kenya are being improved with the help of China. The main road by our campus was paved shortly before we came. It was a very rough track before, especially after rain. The highway from our area to Kisumu was in the process of being repaved when we came three years ago and is now very good. The half dozen main streets of Sondu, the nearest town, were paved for the first time a couple of months ago. The road past the gate of our campus, like most roads is rough dirt with lots of rocks and ruts. We have been on some roads which are paved but have so many huge potholes that they are worse to drive on than those that are not paved. Google maps also shows as "roads" single track public paths that can are used by foot or motorcycles although some are wide enough for our four-wheel drive vehicle.

Please pray for us, praising God for opening doors for the gospel, thanking Him leading us to those who need to know Him, and asking Him to keep us safe in all our travels.
