Ghost-Place or Garden?

What a difference understanding a single word can make! In class last week one of my students asked, "What is peponi? It doesn't sound like such a nice place." He was reading from his Swahili bible, where Jesus says to the criminal on the cross, "Today you will be with me in peponi." In Swahili, if you break down the word peponi, you get pepo, which means "ghost" or "demon," plus the suffix -ni, which indicates location. Thus, to someone unfamiliar with the word, peponi suggests the idea of a "ghost-place" or even "demon-place." You can understand my student's concern! His next question, however, was exactly the right one: "What does the original Greek word for peponi mean?" From there we started a long discussion of the Greek paradeisos (from which we get our English "paradise"). Paradeisos means "garden," and it is used many times in the Greek translation of Genesis to refer to the garden of Eden, a place of water rather than aridity, life rather

At the time of death believers are gathered together with Jesus in a gardenlike place of order and life, awaiting the glorious day of the resurrection of the body. Jesus joined us in death, and we will join Him in resurrection. As a result of our discussion of that single word *peponi* last week, I think that our seminary students are just a little bit better equipped to share our glorious hope in Christ with the people of Tanzania. Thanks for supporting their spiritual formation.
