

# LCMS Alliance Project

This is an international mission partnership between the LCMS and our sister church in Brazil (the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Brazil – IELB based on the Brazilian spelling of their name). It takes advantage of the strengths of both church bodies and helps each reach beyond their current capacity.

The LCMS has been involved in international mission work for most of her existence,

(actually, from even before her formal beginning as many of the people who started the LCMS came to the US as missionaries from Germany). We have a long history with solid mission theology and experience. I have seen many mission organizations in Africa and I am very proud of and thankful for ours. If I could identify one weakness of LCMS missions, it is the low number of pastors going into the international mission field. As Jesus said, "The harvest is plentiful, but the workers are few."

The IELB is a theologically strong church body that produces very well educated, biblically faithful, committed pastors. Recently, she has been training more pastors than needed to fill congregational positions in the country. However, as a church body, she has not had a strong presence in international missions, and therefore, hasn't had the time and experience to develop a robust system for expanding and supporting international mission work like the LCMS has.

IELB is filling many positions in both Africa and Latin American mission fields. The LCMS benefits from the faithful service of very good pastors and IELB benefits by learning from our many years of experience in international missions. And many, many more people hear the Good News of Jesus Christ.



## Did you know...?

Shoulder dancing is a popular form of dance in Ethiopia. It is called "Eskesta" dancing. Tribal life in Ethiopia contributed to the formation which involves the head, chest and shaking the shoulders in a rhythmic way. It is used in songs pertaining to love, war, religion, shepherding and hunting. It went viral on TikTok a little while back. Even little children start to learn it here.
